#### **Classification Committee Reconvenes**

The Winter Championships are in full swing, and things have been going fast and furiously here at the NSAA office. The weather has yet to cooperate with us during the Winter Championship season however, Swimming & Diving took place this past weekend and went very well. The weather was definitely a

factor, but due to good planning on part of the member schools, parents and our office, the tournament went off without a hitch. Thanks to all who made it happen!

Our classification Committee will meet on Wednesday, February 27<sup>th</sup> in Grand Island. This committee consists of 14 administrators from across the state, with at least two administrators from each of the six districts. We are committed to making NSAA activities the best that they can be. Part of this process means looking at how we classify our schools. Last year we decided that we would classify football differently than we do the rest of our activities.

In football, schools are put into classification based on enrollment numbers in their school, grades nine through 11. The thought process was that in football, it was fairer to compete against teams with a number that was closer to your enrollment. With that being said, we also thought that classifying students in their activities should be by gender, and I believe that this is going well.

At our meeting, we will be discussing how this change has effected the NSAA and our member schools. We have asked the committee members to talk to their district school administrators to see if there are any other topics that we should discuss.

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Classification Committee Reconvenes from page 1

To date, we have received the following topics:

1. Classify all activities by using enrollment numbers like football. The rationale being, this would allow schools to play in the same classification in all sports during a two year scheduling cycle. This would also allow schools the opportunity to build schedules for each sport in the classification in which they are competing in. According to some, the current system of determining the number of schools per classification and reviewing the numbers each year can create a competitive imbalance. This is due to the fact that often time schools play their regular season games in one class and compete in Districts and State in another class.

**2. Adding a classification of nine-man football.** The rationale is, in recent years there have been teams in football that cannot qualify for the State Playoffs. Adding nine-man football may give these schools a chance to play in the Playoffs. The committee will discuss and decide if this is something that we should continue conversation, or should the discussion be about increasing the eight-man number in order to qualify to play in the Playoffs.

**3. Number of classifications in each activity.** Rationale being, we have four classes in wrestling and track, while we have six classes in the majority of the other activities. Does this need to change because of the coops and the lesser number of schools that we have today? In some activities, we are really struggling to get host sites for districts.

If more discussion is created from our membership, it too will be addressed at this meeting. The agenda will not be fully developed until the day of the meeting. If you haven't heard from one of the committee members, please feel free to contact our office with your recommendations.

The meeting in February will not be the last on this topic as I realize that you will read this article after the meeting takes place, and I'm sure there will be another meeting coming. The NSAA is committed to our member schools and truly believes that this ongoing dialog on how to improve our organization will be good for all of us.

Good luck to the winter activities that have yet to finish their season and spring needs to get here soon!

## Unified Sports, Track & Field Exhibition Events

#### Music Copyright & License Compliance Update

Music Copyright & License Compliance continues to be a hot topic nationally and continues to evolve and change. The NSAA will continue to serve as a "messenger" on this topic but encourages member schools to seek local, legal counsel when working through specifics.

Professional Rights Organizations / NFHS Update:

<u>ASCAP</u>: The NFHS and ASCAP are currently operating under a provisional national blanket license that covers both high school and state association events. This license extends to all interscholastic events that occur outside of the face to face exemption in Title 17 section 110. This will include state events that are also held at off-site neutral locations such as a community auditoriums or colleges.

**SESAC**: At this time the NFHS is still working with SESAC to find a beneficial solution, there will be another update when more information is available. In the meantime if you or your school require a license please contact their licensing department at 615-320-0055.

**<u>BMI</u>**: If any member high school has questions regarding the need for a license agreement for the public performance of music in their school they may reach out to BMI by calling 888-985-6541 to discuss available options. BMI has developed a high school license for those schools that believe a blanket license would best serve their needs to cover their athletic events and other uses of music covered by BMI used throughout their school.

The NSAA encourages member schools to assess their school-wide music use and recommends that Activities Directors, Principals, Music Directors and Cheer / Dance team sponsors view the NFHS course, *Understanding Copyright & Compliance* (www.nfhslearn.com).

Stay tuned for more developments as they become available.

#### **Baseball Equipment Update**

The most up-to-date information from the NFHS regarding cheek/jaw protectors (C-Flap) has been posted to the NSAA Baseball webpage. This <u>MEMO</u>, echoes the NSAA stance: A face mask/guard specifically designed for a particular helmet model may be attached after manufacture, provided that procedure is approved by the manufacturer and meets the NOCSAE standard at the time of manufacture. And, the responsibility to verify this falls on the member school/AD/coach.

Umpires will not be able to verify the information listed above as there is no NOCSAE seal on any cheek/jaw protectors. Umpires will continue to ask the question of coaches for verification during their pre-game plate meeting: "Are your players legally and properly equipped?"

**2020, NOCSAE Standard:** As communicated the past two seasons, there are significant requirements that will be enacted during the 2020 high school baseball season regarding equipment (baseballs/catcher's protective gear) and proper NOCSAE certification. #### Statement of Principle on Conduct Synopsis

Adopted by the NDE, NSAA, NCSA, NASB, NSEA, NRCSA, NCA and NSIAAA

Recently, students in our schools have been experiencing negative, harassing, and bullying conduct during the school day, and at school activities by the spectators attending those events or, and at times by opponents in an activity, that is directed at the school's participants and spectators, often with a racial component. Such conduct is unacceptable and does not reflect the foregoing basic tenants of our society.

It is the responsibility of our organizations to promote and respect the liberty interests of all persons who may participate in or attend any educational endeavor sponsored by our organizations which includes ensuring that common courtesy is shown for all persons, insuring tranquility for all, and being responsible that no one person abuses their liberties to the detriment of other persons.

As the educational leaders of Nebraska's school system, we firmly support Nebraska schools and communities in proactively involving teachers, administrators, students, parents, and community members in developing and maintaining a positive school and community culture that supports learning opportunities for all persons, and ensures that respect and courtesy are shown to all persons.

Conduct by any person that does not show respect for and courtesy of other persons in Nebraska schools and any school activity is prohibited and shall not be tolerated – period.



#### A Reminder to Compete With Respect

Concerns have been expressed in regard to the lack of respect being afforded to students, coaches, officials, spectators and host staff.

Schools should understand the seriousness of their responsibility to everyone and the privilege of representing their school and community. As educators, we must recommit ourselves to the preservation of respect. Unfair acts prohibited by the spirit and intent of the rules include the use of disconcerting acts or words.

Deliberately disrespecting the rules and fellow participants in the hope or expectation of gaining an advantage is deplorable and indefensible. It is imperative that administrators, coaches, officials and students make an extra effort to model the type of behavior that illustrates the educational values of activity participation. Conduct that berates, intimidates or threatens anyone, based on gender, ethnicity, or sexual preference is unacceptable.

The NSAA Student Advisory Committee is a diverse group of students who participate in interscholastic athletics/activities and are focused on providing education and leadership through open and honest communication with all member schools and their students, administrators and coaches. This committee serves as a liaison between students, administrators, the NSAA Staff and Board of Directors. The Student Advisory Committee helps to promote the mission of the NSAA, including leadership, sportsmanship and integrity.

#### **Requirements for Ejected Coaches & Players**

Enforcement of the "sit-out rule" for ejections from high school contests for unsportsmanlike conduct is a responsibility of the member school. Failure to properly enforce this rule could result in other sanctions by the NSAA.

Administrators will be expected to promptly file a report with the NSAA whenever a participant or coach from their school has been ejected from any high school contest. Such filing must be done online under the AD login section of the NSAA website.

Enforcement of the "sit-out rule" is expected to begin immediately, regardless whether it is regular-season or tournament play.

Any athlete ejected from a contest for unsportsmanlike conduct shall be ineligible for the next athletic contest at that level of competition and any other athletic contest at any level during the interim. Any athlete ejected for a second time during a season from a contest for unsportsmanlike conduct shall be ineligible for the next two contests at that level of competition and all other athletic contests at any level during the interim. Any athlete ejected for a third time during a season from a contest for unsportsmanlike conduct shall be ineligible for the next three contests at that level of competition and all other athletic contests at any level during the interim. Any athlete ejected for a third time during a season from a contest for unsportsmanlike conduct shall be ineligible for the next three contests at that level of competition and all other athletic contests at any level during the interim, in addition to other penalties the NSAA or school may assess. During the time of their "sit-out" suspension, athletes who are ejected for unsportsmanlike conduct may not suit up or participate, but it is the school's discretion whether such athlete is able to travel with the team or sit on the team bench. (The athlete is permitted to practice per school's discretion.)

Coaches who are ejected for the first time will be required to sit-out the next contest at that level, plus all other contests at any level during the interim. Coaches may not be present at the contest site during the time of their "sit-out" suspension. The coach will also be required to successfully complete the NFHS online course "TEACHING AND MODELING BEHAVIOR" within 10 days of the ejection.

Coaches who are ejected a second time in a season will be required to sit-out the next two contests at that level, plus all other contests at any level during the interim. Coaches may not be present at the contest site during the time of their "sit-out" suspension. The coach will also be required to successfully complete the NFHS online course "FUNDAMENTALS OF COACHING" within 10 days of the ejection.

#### Medical Personnel at Regular Season Contests

Severe injuries, sudden illnesses and other critical incidents do not often occur during school activities, but it is important for every school to have an emergency action plan (EAP) for administrators, faculty, coaches and staff members to follow should emergencies occur. Due to lack of universal availability of medical coverage and other logistical reasons, NSAA does not require that schools have a physician, trainer or ambulance on-site at regular season activities; however, each school should have a plan in place should there be an emergency involving students, coaches, officials or spectators requiring medical attention.



#### Are your head and assistant coaches C.E.R.T.I.F.I.E.D?

NSAA Bylaw 2.12 stipulates, "In order to serve as a head or assistant coach or sponsor of any activity sponsored by the NSAA, the individual must possess a valid Nebraska Teaching Certificate or Nebraska Administrative and Supervisory Certificate and have a written contract of employment as a coach or sponsor with the schools in which he/she is to perform these duties." Yes, this does include coaches/directors/sponsors/advisers in the non-athletic activities as well: Play Production, Music, Speech and Journalism.

Individuals that do not possess either of the certificates listed above, may serve as a head or assistant as long as they successfully complete the requirements for a Special Services Coaching Permit (*NSAA Bylaw 2.12.2*). This information can be found on the NSAA webpage under the Coaches tab. It is important to remember that certification is not complete until the individual has applied and received their certificate from the Nebraska Department of Education Certification Office. Schools should request a copy of the certificate and have it on file at the school.

Non-certified personnel may be contracted by the school, but such personnel shall be Coaches Aides. *(NSAA Bylaw 2.12.3).* There are restrictions and limitations for Coaches Aides. Refer to the respective Bylaw for a complete listing in regard to Coaches Aides.

#### Are your officials on the NSAA Officials Roster?

#### 3.12.2 Officials for Varsity Contests.

Only those officials who are registered with the Association may be used by member high schools to officiate varsity competition in football, baseball, basketball, wrestling, soccer, softball and volleyball competition, and start track & field meets.

Athletic Directors are expected to confirm that all officials hired to officiate varsity contests have been classified by the NSAA. The NSAA Officials Roster is available on your AD login page under "**NSAA OFFICIALS & JUDGES**."

#### Through Support of NFHS Foundation, 600 AEDs Sent to High Schools, State Associations

INDIANAPOLIS, IN (February 26, 2019) — The ongoing effort by the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS), through the NFHS Foundation, to equip schools with Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs) took a significant step forward last month with a shipment of more than 600 AEDs to high schools and state high school associations.

Similar to the initial distribution of more than 400 AEDs in February 2018, state associations were able to request AEDs for schools without the life-saving units. The most recent response resulted in the NFHS Foundation awarding more than 600 Phillips Onsite AEDs to schools and state association offices in 24 states.
