Included in this memo are the <mark>49</mark> proposals that passed at least one district at the November meetings.

The <mark>23</mark> Constitution/Bylaw proposal passing three or more districts will advance to Representative Assembly.

All Approved Ruling (Activities Manual) proposals will be placed on the April NSAA Board of Directors agenda as action items regardless of the number of districts that pass them.

The following procedure is to be followed at the second district meeting:

- 1. All 49 proposals should be acted upon.
- 2. A simple majority passes the proposal.
- 3. Each member school is entitled to one vote. The administrative head of the school or his/her designee shall be considered the authorized voting representative.
- 4. **Amendments** to proposals are *not permitted*.
- 5. New proposals may not be introduced from the floor.
- 6. Elections shall be held for officers, alternates, and Representative Assembly delegates.

	*This proposal would also update language in Bylaw 1.10.3.12 regarding the methods used to communicate the determination eliminating the requirement for certified mail.
Rationale:	This proposal removes language about causing physical harm and adds language about mental health, prioritizing the need to address the students' mental health prior to a request for a hardship waiver. The proposal also removes the need for the determination to be delivered via Certified Mail.
Pros:	With mental health concerns on the rise for students, this updated language emphasizes the importance of mental health care and support for students.

Rationale:	As the population of Nebraska continues to shift eastward, this proposal more evenly distributes member schools into the six legislative districts. Equal distribution based on student population presents many challenges based on the geography of Nebraska. While this proposal does not bring an exact balance, it creates a more equal distribution of both schools and students, while continuing to account for geography.
Pros:	Under this proposal, schools and students in eastern Nebraska would be more evenly distributed in District 1 and District 2; while the schools and students in the remaining districts would also be more evenly distributed than with current boundaries.
Cons:	Of the 309 member schools, 118 would change districts.

Rationale:	This proposal would remove restrictions on coaches during open gym/facility time during the school year, out-of-season period. This will allow coaches to work on skill development with an unlimited number of students at one time. This could allow coaches and students to continue developing their team and skills within an education-based environment, focused on the well-being of students.
Pros:	<ul> <li>Provides equal access to coaching and skill development for all students at a member school.</li> <li>Allows coaches to stay connected to their students during the offseason.</li> <li>Saves time for coaches.</li> <li>Gives parents a choice - education-based instruction/development vs. for-profit youth sports organizations.</li> <li>This proposal prevents school teams from competing against other school teams. The organized practice rule is still in effect for any school year, out-of-season competition.</li> </ul>
Cons:	Lack of facilities to hold open gym/facility time because facilities are in use by in-season activities (i.e. volleyball open gym during basketball season). Management of coaches and the time for multi-sport, in-season athletes will be the responsibility of each member school administration.

	This allows flexibility for schools in scheduling games. Schools who do not have two reliable "tournaments" (as defined above) are currently either forced to find two or play fewer contests. This proposal does not allow for any more contests than what is already allowed: $18 + 3$ (tournament 1) +3 (tournament 2) = 24.
Rationale:	This proposal would allow for more flexibility in scheduling, without adding any more total contests than what is already allowed. Teams that do not have two reliable tournaments each year will able to add single contests or even play in shootouts where you could potentially play more than one game with no real bracket in place. Currently, if you do not play in the two tournaments you do not have much flexibility in finding replacement games. Shootouts are more common in other states and making a change would allow schools to find additional games to supplement their schedule without the need for something with a bracket.
	Additionally, many of our surrounding states do not limit contests with tournaments as a part of their rules for contest limitations. Iowa allows 21 total contests with the possibility of 22 contests if the school is adding the 22nd game to assist another school in filling that school's schedule. Iowa does not allow games between Christmas and New Years. Missouri allows for 26 total contests. Kansas currently allows for 20 total contests with the possibility of 21 if a school participates in a tournament where they have to play four games. Kansas is said to be expanding to 23 total games beginning next school year.
	In summary, this proposal allows schools to fill their schedule with any combination of games, tournaments, etc so long as you don't exceed 24 games (exception of play-in game).

After post-season seeding, the host schools will be assigned to one of the six districts so there is one host-school per district. The NSAA Director of Bowling will make the simplest one-team trades between districts so that host teams with the closest wildcard point average to a team in another district are switched. The top-6 seeds will not be switched in order to split up the host schools. A horizontal switch with the closest wildcard point average will be made within the row of the host school. Summary:

	This proposal is to address the current situation with how Bowling Districts are set geographically. This initial method of setting Bowling Districts was relevant when Bowling was starting due to the number of teams competing initially. Now, there are 30 teams competing in Class A and assigning districts using the geographical method fails to balance the districts properly. If we can implement the Serpentine method for determining Bowling Districts, we will be able to balance the teams and provide a better opportunity for the best 8 teams to qualify for the State Competition.
Rationale:	This would match what is currently being used in the majority of our athletic events sponsored by the NSAA to set District assignments. This would also potentially prevent 3-4 of the top teams in the sport from competing in the same district. Last year, in A-6 of the Boys Class A District 3 of the top 7 teams were in the same district.
Pros:	Provide balance to the Bowling District Tournament and allow more opportunities for our athletes and teams to qualify for State.
Cons:	The one glaring issue will be travel for teams as transportation costs may increase due to how Districts are created.

	Based on combined boy and girl enrollment, grades 9-11.
	Schools with a total enrollment of 850 and above will be in class A. Note: Classifications will be done on a yearly basis, except in class A, which will be done on a two-year classification. 2022 was the 1st year of the two-year class A classification period.
	Schools with the total enrollment of 320 to 849 will be in class B.
	Schools with the total enrollment of 125 to 319 will be in class C.
	The remaining schools registered for Cross Country shall be in class D.
Rationale:	Setting total enrollment for each class will eliminate the high discrepancy from smallest to largest schools for Cross Country. This rationale has been used in Football for years and has worked well for classes A and B. This proposal would help to eliminate the schools that are outliers in the classification and do not naturally match up well with the rest of their prospective class, making classifications less spread out from top to bottom, leveling the playing field for all schools. When a school only needs 4 runners to score it is important that schools are not put at a disadvantage due to their size in comparison to the other schools within their class. Cross Country is not like any other sport. What works best for other sports is not necessarily what works best for Cross Country. Evening out the discrepancy from smallest to largest schools eliminating outlier sized schools in a class. As schools are built in our state and rural schools continue to get smaller and urban schools continue to grow the way that we classify our sport will need to continue to change as well. Our traditional Class B and Class C communities are changing and this can be a way to help level the playing field for many schools.
Pros:	Bringing class B and C to an even ratio between the smallest and largest schools within each class. Matching Classes B and C more closely to what is already existing in class A with a set size of schools within the class. This would bring stability to Cross Country classifications from year to year. Although some schools will always be on the borders of each class and bounce back and forth from time to time it would leave less discrepancy between classes. It would eliminate a lot of the complaints about classifications that seem to be a constant topic of conversation within coaching circles and the large discrepancies that currently exist. This can also eliminate much of the stress that coaches feel during the classification process. With this proposal we can hopefully move in a direction that is best for the sport long term.
Cons:	This will change our current classification numbers by just a few schools in Classes B, C, and D.

get a lot of kids out and who cannot play 11-man football on their own.	

2. It would help those schools who want to co-op. I am aware of a couple of situations where struggling 8-man programs wanted to explore options with their 8-man neighbors, but immediately shut down talks when they realized that adding their enrollments together would put them into 11-man or as an 8-man ineligible team.

The division of classes would be as follows: D1 - the largest eligible 32 schools D2 and D3 -remaining schools would be split evenly. If the number does not divide out equally, the first extra team would go into D3.

In terms of bonus points and playing across classes, teams would get 1 bonus point for playing up a division and 2 bonus points for playing up two divisions. Every effort should be made to schedule teams within classes against each other, but our geography may require that a D1 play a D2, or a D2 play a D3 because of a lack of available teams in an area. Every effort would be used to not schedule a D3 vs a D1 because of the overall differences in school size. D3 vs D1 would only be allowed if the D3 school agreed to playing the D1 school. In the new three-class 8-man system, all teams would play 9 regular season games, and the playoffs would move to 16 teams in each of the three classes. This would align with the current structure of both 11-man and 6-man football. All playoff games could be played on Friday nights.

This proposal would impact the Activities Manual from pages 53-58, D1 and D2 Playoffs.

## Proposal Summary:

This proposal would change the way that the 8-man football playoffs are structured. Currently, we seed the playoffs #1-#16 in the east and #1-#16 in the west. After the first round, there is a re-seed to a statewide #1-#16.

This proposal would put the 32 teams into a single playoff bracket that would be seeded #1-#32 without any regard for geography. This proposal would mathematically reduce the possibility of rematches in the first round of the playoffs. In the 2024 D1 and D2 playoffs, there were 8 first round rematches out of 32 first round games (25% rematch rate). If the playoffs had been seeded #1-#32 without geography, that number would have dropped to 4 first round rematches (12.5% rematch rate).

# Pros:

It would provide a true playoff bracket where teams are matched up with an opponent of the appropriate point standing.

It would help reduce the possibilities of first-round rematches.

# Cons:

There is a possibility for more travel in this system. (2024 Playoffs as is, the average D1 playoff game was 120.6 miles; D2 was at 131.2 miles.....in the proposed method, that number would jump to 167.4 in D1 (+46.8 miles) and to 170.1 in D2 (+38.9 miles).

\*\*District A-1 teams schedule will consist of games vs. the other teams in District A-1 and District A-2 teams schedules will consist of games vs. the other teams in District A-2 as determined by the scheduling committee.

\*\*Each school will have the opportunity to request up to 2 two rivalry or out of state games (2 total). Rivalry/Out of state games are games that are mutually agreed upon by both of the schools. If both schools agree, schools from A-1 could play schools from A-2 provided there are an even number of other schools from A-1 and A-2 that also agree to play rivalry or out of state games that create enough matchups for games that do not require other A-1 vs. A-2 games that are not mutually agreed upon by both schools. Out of state games would also be dependent on leaving an even amount of teams to fill games for the rest of the teams in each district in weeks 1-9.

# The only time that games involving Class A and Class B schools would be considered is if the following criteria is met:

1. There is an odd number of schools in Class A for the two year scheduling cycle

2. All rivalry games between A-1 and A-2 schools that have been approved by the scheduling committee have been scheduled

3. All out of state games that have been approved by the scheduling committee have been scheduled 4. Both the Class A and B programs that would compete against each other have approved the matchup

### **Playoffs/Bowl Games:**

**Playoffs:** All of the schools in district A-1 will qualify for the playoffs each year.

Playoff Seeding: Seeding will be determined by final regular season wildcard points.

Playoff Host: Will be the higher seeded team throughout the playoffs

**Optional Bowl Games:** A2 teams will be matched up to play a bowl game with schools being matched up to play in order of wildcard points finish. Team 17 will play team 18 and so on until all schools have been assigned a bowl game.

The higher seeded team will host. If teams have previously played during weeks 7-9 and both do not agree to play again, they may appeal to the scheduling committee to find an alternative opponents for their bowl game. The scheduling committee will then have the ability to alter bowl game matchups to create match-ups that do not include rematches between teams that do not agree to the rematch.

Bowl Games will be treated as a regular season home games for the host schools.

If there is an uneven number of teams in A2, the scheduling committee may schedule a play-in game where the school that finishes 17th in final wildcard points has a bye week 10. Schools finishing in spots 18 and 19 would play week 10 and the winner will advance to play team 17 in week 11.

The remaining bowl matchups would then start with the school finishing 20th in wildcard points playing the school that finished 21st and so on until all teams have been matched up with a week 10 bowl game.

Teams participating in a week 10 bowl game would be done with their season after week 10 with the exception of the week 11 game between the school finishing 17th and the winner of the 18/19 matchup.

### Summary:

Creation of "AB Football" to allow schools traditionally in Classes A & B to schedule competitive football games. Schools would be assigned a 9 game schedule, with the top 8 schools qualifying for postseason play into the Class AB playoff.

Schools participating in the Class AB will have assigned football games. Schools would be eligible for the state football playoffs in class AB. NSAA staff and the Class AB Schedule Committee would be responsible for playoff assignments and championship awards.

Submit rationale information to Competitive Balance Committee - Friday NSAA Week 21

Competitive Balance Committee approval or denial for participation in Class AB football - Friday NSAA Week 24 <u>Clarification</u> - The Competitive Balance Committee would hear all applications to join AB Football. All schools must meet the criteria established by the Competitive Balance Committee, including special attention to prior years' results, participation numbers, and alternative options for a school's program.

AB Football would be an "opt in" program, not specifically limited to only those in A or B traditionally, but open to those programs looking for more like competition with teams than the present classification system allows. Schedule Format:

9 regular season games assigned by Class AB Schedule Committee

List of priority game requests will be accepted for rival or conference games (not guaranteed)

Class AB Football Schedule Committee (5 representatives from schools opting in to the league) Selection: By NSAA Assistant Director for football Committee will be responsible for providing schools a 9 game football schedule Assist in the organization of the Class AB football championship playoffs

Class AB Football Playoff Schedule - Friday (9 game regular season):

NSAA Week 17 - First Round games at higher seed

NSAA Week 18 - Semifinal games at higher seed

NSAA Week 19 - Class AB Football Championship game at higher seed or neutral site

NSAA Bylaws and football procedure manual rules will be followed and enforced. NFHS contest rules and procedures will be used.

### Rationale:

The purpose of the AB Class for football is to enable teams to petition to the NSAA Competitive Balance Committee to enter this new Classification. Teams must be approved by the Competitive Balance Committee to be elgible for this new classification. Qualifying teams will be able to 'opt' into Class AB football. This new option will allow for a more balanced and competitive Class for football teams who have been impacted by several critical factors that have contributed to a large competitive separation between schools in the current Classification system. A schedule that is more competitive each week may create more excitement within a program, allowing for growth to help prevent lopsided contests and forfeits. This may impact several schools; however, the movement should have a positive impact where schools will be given the opportunity to evaluate and advocate for their school to find the best fit possible.

### Pros:

Potential for schools with limited participation numbers to maintain a full schedule

Creates competitive opportunities for students that have limited prior experience or understanding about football. In other locations where similar initiatives have taken effect, participation numbers have grown as like opportunities for contests were created

NSAA Bylaw 2.13.1 - Authority. The Board of Directors shall have the authority to divide the members into classes, determine the number of classes and place the member schools into these classes for competition in each activity sponsored by this Association.

This would not be a championship aligned with the NSAA Finals in Lincoln/Memorial Stadium. Teams within the classification would host playoffs and be responsible for expenses of those contests, and not affecting the general membership of the association.

The creation of AB football would also allow teams from multiple classifications to opt-in, perhaps providing an option for schools that have opted-down to now find more like opportunities for scheduling games

Rationale:	Due to decreasing participation numbers in some schools, many teams have limited numbers of players out for sports which make it difficult to have enough high school participants to practice. Allowing 7th and 8th grade managers to participate in practice may allow teams to have adequate numbers of students to have effective practice sessions, drills and scrimmages. Especially in wrestling where there may be a large difference in size of members of the high school team, scho may allow junior high managers who are closer in size to the high school participants to participate in practice which would result in safer practice partners.

Add to the Dual State qualifying procedures for class A and B: The wild card points will be calculated the same as currently in the Wrestling Activities Manual with the exception that the results of all duals up to two weeks prior to the NSAA Dual State Championship shall be used for class A and B. The sixteen teams with the highest wild card point averages will qualify for the district final. The sixteen teams qualifying for the district final will be placed on a 16-team bracket based on wildcard point averages through districts. The higher seeded team will host the district final dual. The teams winning the district final will advance to the Dual State Championship. Any class A or B school that qualifies for the District Championship through the wildcard point system and do not wish to compete or is ineligible because of not meeting the minimum number of duals competed in, must notify the NSAA no later than 9:00 A.M. on the Monday of Week 30 of the NSAA calendar (the Monday two weeks prior to the Dual Championships). If a school does not wish to compete, each team in the wildcard point system will move up one spot and the next team would

be invited to replace them.

Rationale:	This proposal will create a fairer system for teams to qualify for the Dual State Championship. Since we are eliminating one dual during the season and replacing it with the District Championship dual it has little or no affect on cost to the school or NSAA and little or no impact on coachâ€ <sup>TM</sup> s and student instruction time.
	The reason for this change is that teams may be different at the end of the season than in the beginning. Because of individual weight management plans teams with schools playing football deep into the playoffs are at a disadvantage because of the individuals not beginning their weight decent during the football playoffs. This will help kids cut their weight in a safer and more healthy way. Otherwise, they may resort to drastic weigh cutting measures to make their wrestling weight in a short amount of time after their last playoff game.
	Another reason is some teams have adjusted their schedule to have a better chance of qualifying to state. They have gotten out of tougher duals or dual tournaments and scheduled lower-level competitions to take a lesser risk of loss but still earn the same wild card points especially in class B. For example, this past season there was a team in class B that beat the class B Dual State Champions, and they received as many wild card points as anther class B team that beat a class C team that went 0-2 with blow out loses of 63-18 and 53-22 in the class C Dual State Tournament.
	The differences in scheduling of dual also create a possibility disparity between earning wild card points. Some teams only schedule 8-10 duals while others schedule 25+ duals (because of dual tournaments).
	Injuries and illnesses can also have an impact on teams, and we are trying to get the best teams at the end of the season.
Pros:	Improve quality of the Dual State Tournament by improving the qualifying procedures and get the best teams into the Dual State Tournament.
	Allow teams to keep the season schedule as they wish. This may reduce the overall travel time off setting any potential extra travel for the District Championship. Because teams can schedule closer competition and not have to worry about scheduling competition further away to help their wild card points.
	Provide an opportunity for the kids to cut weight after the fall sports complete in a safer and more healthy manner.
Cons:	Teams below the sixteenth position in the wild card points may lose one dual to their season. Because of the proximity of most class A and B schools most teams may not travel any further than in the past with the previous 8 dual schedule, however, there may be a couple of schools that may have to travel more for one dual than in the past.
