

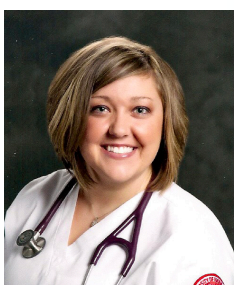
NSAA Sports Medicine Advisory Committee

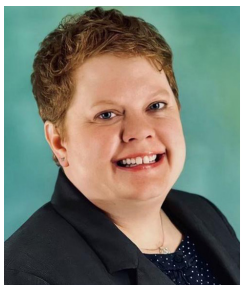
